How Can I Become More Involved in the Coalition?

Sometimes my partner Nicole and I think of the LGBT Family Coalition as our 3rd child. It was born a few months before our first son and just like our boys, who started out tiny, it has grown and changed in amazing ways over the years. We are a far way from the 40 parents and future parents who met up in our living room back in 1998.

For one, more than 1000 families from across the province have now joined the group. Aside from our base in Montreal, we now have satellite groups in both Quebec City and the Outaouais region. We have many more activities than we had in the beginning, for both parents and future parents. And attendance at our family activities keeps growing every year.

Also, although in the first years many of our battles were about gaining rights for our families, now our focus is much more on changing attitudes. With the funding of Quebec's Ministry of Education we have developed a half-day workshop and numerous resources to help professionals in schools and social services to better know our families and to fight homophobic discrimination.

But whether our members have been around since the founding of the group or have joined more recently, many realise that though the situation for our families has vastly improved over the years, there is still much work to do. We all want to contribute to making the world a better place for our children. If you find that you might have the time, here are some areas where you can get involved:

Lending your skills: Some of you have skills that could be very useful to the Coalition. For instance we often use graphic designers, translators, party animators, caterers, and even filmmakers. We also need writers for our newsletter and promotional materials. If you are an educator you can help us create better tools to fight homophobia. Sometimes we have to deal with legal, medical or psychological questions. Maybe you have a skill that we need, that we didn't even know we needed! Your special talent or expertise may come in handy.

Fund-raising: Having enough money to carry out our work is essential. Perhaps you have experience fund-raising. You have a great idea that might bring in some cash. Or you're part of a company that might want to sponsor our group. Maybe you have a large network of people at your work, in your social circle or even in your family that are potential donors. There are many ways that you can help to promote the Coalition.

Our board of directors: Each year in April at our Annual General Assembly, our members elect the board of directors. Board members get involved in projects with our members, with the LGBT community or with the general public. Board members also make decisions about how the Coalition is run.

Our committees: Throughout the year we have the need for help with specific projects or events. For instance, the pride weekend in August is an event where your ideas and volunteer hours would be useful.

Or sometimes we have a specific task that needs to be done. We'll contact you by e-mail and if it fits with your schedule it would be great to have your help, even if it is only over a short period.

Our workshops: If you are a very strong communicator and have flexible work hours, you might want to get involved in carrying out trainings in schools and social services. In the past two years we have trained over 3000 professionals and the demand keeps growing. Becoming an animator for the Coalition is a demanding job, but it is one of the most rewarding ways to make the world a better place for our kids.

News Briefs: June - August 2011

Montreal-Quebec News

July 8 2011 - On the website *Renouveau charismatique catholique au Canada* (Catholic Charismatic Renewal of Canada), one can find the *Fraternité Sainte-Famille of Gatineau*, a religious community offering training sessions for healing through prayer. Amongst the diseases: homosexuality and masturbation. Healing of physical ailments through prayer is also possible according to the movement.

Roger Monderie, founder of the *Journée des rêves* program in the Outaouais region (for children and families in need) has collected over \$30,000 for the *Centre Espoir-Jeunesse de la Fraternité Sainte-Famille*. He approves of these workshops though he admits that he didn't know they existed.

"Yes, if a boy has this problem (homosexuality), if it can help, that's perfect. I support programs for healing homosexuality... I'm a Catholic and I go to mass every Sunday."

Courses offered by the community's Henri Lemay include a "Training to heal homosexuality".

The term "healing" implies an illness, but Mr. Lemay told the *Journal Le Droit* that he has gay friends and is not qualifying homosexuality as an illness. In his eyes, "Homosexuality is often linked to trauma that people have lived through."

This religious community joins another, the Notre-Dame-des-Champs Church in Repentigny, that was reported in 2009 to give workshops to parents. Michel Lizotte's poster invited parents to: "Help my Child Develop his Heterosexual Potential." On the syllabus: "How parents can accompany their child toward heterosexuality" and "Undesired attraction toward the same-sex".

In a nutshell, workshops to assure that your child doesn't become gay, with the blessing of the parish priest, Christian Lepine.

At least all Catholics don't see things this way. Father Raymond Gravel, ex-Bloc québécois deputy whose riding included Repentigny said: «Imagine a child who discovers he's gay and on top of this has to endure the pressure of his parents wanting him to develop his 'heterosexual potential'. These parents will go to this kind of workshop and become convinced that their child can be 'cured'. Terrible!"

Gay Marriage News

June 14 – (Paris) France’s National Assembly votes on a Socialist party measure to open marriage to same-sex couples. The proposition is rejected with 293 deputies against vs 222 in favour. This decision comes despite the fact that 58% of the French population are in favour of same-sex marriage according to a *TNS Sofress* survey carried out in January 2011.

June 27 (Philippines) The Metropolitan Community Church (MCC) performs wedding rites for eight gay couples in **Baguio City**. The wedding rites are patterned after the traditional Catholic ceremonies and officiated by pastors Mike Sotero, Egay Constantino, Ceejay Agbayani and Regen Luna of MCC. Sotero said the wedding ceremony gathered the biggest number since 2003. “They can use the documents we give here when they go to countries which allow same sex marriages.”

July 12 (New York) Adoption lawyers and agencies in New York get ready for a baby boom as same-sex couples emboldened by the prospect of the state’s new gay marriage law will take the next step and try to adopt children. The state already permits unmarried couples, both gay and straight, to adopt children. But a wedding ring is an important milestone in a relationship – and can also bolster a couple’s case as they try to impress social workers, adoption agencies and birth mothers during the often competitive adoption process, couples and adoption experts say. Nationwide, about 19,000 gay couples have already adopted children as of 2009.

July 18 (Buenos Aires) It has been a big year for gay marriages in **Argentina**: Since the country became the first in Latin America to legalize same-sex marriages, a total of 2,697 gay and lesbian couples have tied the knot. That’s according to Argentina’s lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender federation. It says 60 percent of the weddings were between men, and the province with the most such weddings was Buenos Aires. But gays say not all has been rosy since Argentina’s congress approved the law on July 15, 2010. They say they still have trouble persuading civil authorities to register their children under both names.

July 19 (Washington) President Barack Obama’s support for the *Respect of Marriage Act* is announced by Press Secretary Jay Carney, showing Obama’s support for the federal recognition of gay marriage. The bill would repeal the *Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA)*, which currently bans any federal recognition of gay marriages that are performed by the states. This prevents, for example, gay spouses of those in the military from receiving benefits, and gay couples from claiming each other’s Social Security benefits, among other harms. DOMA is being discussed at a historic meeting with the Senate Judiciary Committee July 20.

Obama won the 2008 election with an official stance against gay marriage, saying he supported civil unions. In past months he has said his idea on marriage equality was “evolving.”

July 24 (New York) At **Manhattan’s** City Clerk’s Office early Sunday morning more than 800 couples line up to marry in New York City on the first day it is legal in the state. Some wear gowns; some wear kilts; one couple wear a crown and full legal regalia. But dozens of others just wear nice dresses or their best tie, clutching their fiance’s hand as they wait to wed.

Gay marriage has proven so popular in New York City that the city had to implement a lottery system to allow couples a chance of wedding on the first possible day. Around 2,500 couples had entered the lottery.

In the minutes and hours after the law was passed and signed by Democratic Governor Andrew Cuomo late on Friday July 22nd, sparkling rings were offered and accepted and champagne corks flew to kick off wedding plans likely to add an estimated \$284 million to the state’s economy according to a report by the *Independent Democratic Conference*. The report estimated more than 21,000 gay and lesbian couples from New York would marry within the first three years and nearly 42,000 gay and lesbian couples from out of state would travel to New York for a “destination wedding.”

The most populous state to approve marriage equality legislation, New York is the sixth state to legalize gay nuptials, joining Connecticut, Iowa, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Vermont and the District of

Columbia. Civil unions were approved in Delaware, Hawaii, Illinois and New Jersey. Same sex marriage is banned in 39 states.

August 1 (Colombia) Gay Colombians have two years to wait for gay marriage or another similar type of union, after their Constitutional Court ruled that marriage equality should exist. The court decided on July 26 to give the legislature until June 20, 2013 to create an equivalent to same-sex couples who want to get married. If no decision is made by then, gay couples can go to any notary public or judge to formalize their union, reports the Constitutional Court of Colombia.

August 16th (Mexico City) Mexico City has marked its 1,000th same-sex marriage since lawmakers in the capital approved such unions in March 2010.

International News

June 20 (ILGA news) (Ghana) A senior member of Parliament MP David Tetteh Asssuming has warned that the homosexual community in Ghana may soon be at the receiving end of mounting public anger in the form of physical attacks and outright death if they do not stop what he calls their evil deeds.

In an interview with Citi News' Parliamentary Correspondent, Richard Sky, Asssuming said homosexuals operating in the country may have to relocate outside Ghana before the growing public outrage against them degenerates into systematic moves to eliminate them one after another.

"You cannot trace this act to any of the settings in Ghana. So this is foreign. I am saying that Ghanaians cherish our culture a lot so for anybody to adulterate the cultural setting in Ghana as far as this act is concerned, I have the fear that people could take the law into their hands in the future and deal with these people drastically. So I am sending a sign to these people that they will not have it easy in this country. They can leave here and go to other places to practice that. But in this country, I believe that they are treading on dangerous grounds and they could face lynching in the future" he noted.

The Legislator said issues of human rights cannot justify the practice of homosexuality in Ghana, which he according to him, could incur the wrath of God on a "God-fearing nation" like Ghana. Asssuming called on the Police to be more proactive in raiding suspected homosexual joints, believed to be dotted across the country. "I will be opposed to any move in Parliament to have this practice legitimized," he promised.

June 23 (CBS News) (New York) Authorities say six New York City teenagers have been charged with murder as a hate crime in the beating and stomping of an 18-year-old perceived to be gay. Anthony Collao of Bethpage on Long Island was attacked in March while leaving a birthday party in Woodhaven, Queens.

Queens District Attorney Richard A. Brown said the defendants were each charged in a 21-count indictment that includes second-degree murder as a hate crime. Brown said the charges were upgraded after new evidence from witnesses. Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly said previously that the suspects made "homophobic remarks" and scrawled on a wall with red markers after crashing the party.

The defendants could face up to 25 years to life in prison if convicted.

June 17 (AP) (Geneva) The **United Nations** has endorsed the rights of gay, lesbian and transgender people for the first time ever, passing a resolution hailed as historic by the U.S. and other backers and decried by African and Islamic countries. The declaration was cautiously worded, expressing "grave concern" about abuses suffered by people because of their sexual orientation, and commissioning a global report on discrimination of gays. But activists called it a remarkable shift on an issue that has divided the global body for decades, and credited the Obama administration's push for gay rights at home and abroad with helping win support for the resolution.

"This represents a historic moment to highlight the human rights abuses and violations that lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people face around the world based solely on who they are and whom they love," U.S. Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton said in a statement.

Following tense negotiations, members of the Geneva-based U.N. Human Rights Council narrowly voted in favour of the declaration put forward by South Africa, with 23 votes in favour and 19 against. Backers included the United States, the European Union, Brazil and other Latin American countries. Those against included Russia, Saudi Arabia, Nigeria and Pakistan. China, Burkina Faso and Zambia abstained, Kyrgyzstan didn't vote and Libya was earlier suspended from the rights body.

The resolution expressed "grave concern at acts of violence and discrimination, in all regions of the world, committed against individuals because of their sexual orientation and gender identity."

More importantly, activists said, it also established a formal U.N. process to document human rights abuses against gays, including discriminatory laws and acts of violence. According to *Amnesty International*, consensual same-sex relations are illegal in 76 countries worldwide, while harassment and discrimination are common in many more.

July 5 (CP) (New Delhi) India's health minister has derided homosexuality as an unnatural "disease" from the West at an HIV/AIDS conference, drawing outrage from a U.N. official and activists who said the comments set back campaigns for gay rights and against HIV.

In a hastily called news conference, Health Minister Ghulam Nabi Azad said he was misquoted, though video of his speech has aired repeatedly on Indian television.

"Some people have played with the words. I have been quoted out of context," he said. "My reference was to HIV as a disease. As health minister, I know (male homosexual sex) is not a disease."

His original speech however, echoed a common refrain in the conservative South Asian nation that homosexuality is a Western import.

"It is a matter of concern that, unfortunately, in the world and in our country this disease has arisen, where men are having sex with men, which is unnatural and should not be happening," Azad said, speaking in Hindi.

Anjali Gopalan, who heads the NAZ Foundation, a rights group that works with HIV positive people and promotes equal rights for homosexuals, said Azad's initial comments were deeply troubling coming from the health minister of a country fighting a tough battle against HIV infections.

"These comments help no cause. It's definitely not going to help in our fight against HIV," she told The Associated Press.

Roughly 2.5 million Indians have HIV, making it the country with the largest number of people living with the virus in Asia. Experts say the marginalization of gay people keeps them isolated and makes it harder for HIV/AIDS awareness messages to reach them.

July 5 (AFP News) (Karachi) Islamists held rallies in major **Pakistani** cities to denounce a gay rights event hosted by the United States embassy, calling for a "holy war" against ally Washington. Around 100 demonstrators in the southern port city of Karachi protested, calling the event "an assault on Pakistan's Islamic culture", while there were similar demonstrations in the capital Islamabad and in Lahore.

"We condemn the American conspiracy to encourage bisexuality in our country," said Mohammad Hussain Mehnati, city chief of the Jamaat-e-Islami (JI), Pakistan's largest Islamic party, while leading a rally.

"They have destroyed us physically, imposed the so-called war on terrorism on us and now they have unleashed cultural terrorism on us," he said above the din of slogans of "Death to America" by his party cadres.

"This event shows cruel America has unleashed a storm of immoral values on our great Islamic values, which we'll resist at all costs," Mehnati said.

A statement posted on the US Embassy website said its Islamabad office hosted its first lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) Pride Celebration on June 26.

"This gathering demonstrated continued US Embassy support for human rights, including LGBT rights, in Pakistan at a time when those rights are increasingly under attack from extremist elements throughout Pakistani society," it said.

A banner at the rally read: "Americans, we will not allow you to spread your vulgar and ugly civilisation in Pakistan."

July 14 (CNN) California Gov. Jerry Brown has signed a bill requiring all public schools to teach about gay and lesbian contributions to history.

"Senate Bill 48 (SB 48) requires public instruction in social sciences to include the role and contributions of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender Americans, as well as people with disabilities and members of other cultural groups," said the *Sacramento Bee*.

Openly gay Sen. Mark Leno, D-San Francisco, proposed the bill which received no Republican support in the California State Assembly's 49-25 vote of approval last week.

"It is one thing to say that we should be tolerant," Republican Assemblyman Tim Donnelly said, "it is something else altogether for my colleague to say that my children are going to be taught that this lifestyle is good and it is not to be criticized and that anyone that has had any historic role, that this is to be glorified."

Leno hailed Gov. Brown's recent signing of the legislation as "making history in California by ensuring that our textbooks and instructional materials no longer exclude the contributions of LGBT Americans. Denying LGBT people their rightful place in history gives our young people an inaccurate and incomplete view of the world around them. I am pleased Gov. Brown signed the FAIR Education Act and I thank him for recognizing that the LGBT community, its accomplishments and its ongoing efforts for first-class citizenship are important components of California's history."

California is the first state to pass such legislation. Unfortunately, The *Capitol Resource Institute*, operating under *Stop SB 48*, was approved by the California State government on **July 28th** to begin a petition against the act. If they collect more than 504,000 signatures by mid-October, they can have a voter referendum added to the June 2012 ballot.
