YOUR ROLE IS TO PREPARE A LIST OF QUESTIONS FOR THE DISCUSSION.

- A Compose questions that your team might want to answer based on what you have read so far in the book selected.
- B The questions should help your team members talk about what is important in the book, to make links with the theme and share reactions. When preparing the list of questions, consider the ideas and feelings that come to mind as you read.
- C Read your questions out loud and ask members of your group to propose at least one question of their own.

YOUR ROLE IS TO SELECT A FEW PASSAGES IN THE TEXT.

- Find passages that members of your group might like to hear read out loud because it would make them want to read the book. Perhaps it might make you remember an important, amusing or intriguing part of the text. Or, the passage you select might simply relate to the theme to be discussed.
- Once you select passages that you feel are worthwhile, decide how you will share these with your group.
- You can read them out loud yourself or ask someone to read them for you. You could also ask members to read the passage in silence and discuss it afterwards.



- C Tell your team about the links you found and discuss them.

- A Select words which seem important in the passage you selected.
- B Identify the indispensable words used to understand the story. Underline or highlight the words as you read (or reread) and write them down later on.
- C If you find new or unusual words, look up their definition in a dictionary or other source. You might also identify more noticeable words; those that are repeated, used in a particular way, which are amusing or key words. Share the important words with your group members and discuss them.
